HOW TO KNOW WHEN IT IS TIME TO REPLACE YOUR ELECTRICAL METER BASE

Recently, the meter base for my home went out unexpectedly. It turns out that this meter box, located 3 houses down from me, was in terrible condition. It basically "melted" and could have been a real disaster. CLPUD is not responsible for these meter base boxes. I have attached a copy of how this works from the website they directed me to. I was lucky enough to have to replace only the meter base, which was about \$3,000, instead of also needing to replace the underground wires to my house, which would have been 4-5 times more.





REMINDER ON HOA DUES

HOA dues are \$270/month as of January 2024. The last day to pay without receiving a late fee and adding interest is the 25th of each month.

Often, you will notice what appears to be minor electrical glitches; lights dimming, flickering, etc., which can be a sign of trouble with electricity getting to your house from the meter base. But not always, sometimes it just goes out altogether. In my case, the appliance voltage (220-Volt that serves stove, dryer, water heater, etc.) stopped working. Later that evening, the 110-Volt areas began to deteriorate. Lights began to dim in certain areas of the house. In other areas, the 110-Volt was still working.

It's imperative to call CLPUD immediately if you experience these problems. They will send a field person out to check the meter base. In my case, the field service technician arrived within 20 minutes. They will shut off the power if the problem is serious, or let you know you have a certain amount of days to replace the box before they must cut the power. My power was turned off immediately.

HOW TO KNOW WHEN IT IS TIME TO REPLACE YOUR ELECTRICAL METER **BASE**

I was lucky to find a reliable electrician who had this all replaced and fixed within 24 hours. Apparently many of the meter base boxes in Greentrees are the originals, some as old as 50 years. Many have been going out and requiring replacement. It was a total surprise to me that I was having this problem and a big surprise to have to shell out that much money unexpectedly. The electrician said that most electricians provide a service to come out and do a visual inspection of the meter base for a nominal fee, thus alerting the owner that it needs replacing soon. Also, most electricians will work with the customer on payment plans. Had I known that mine was getting to that point, I would have budgeted for this instead of being caught off guard. You may want to locate your box if you don't know where it is and have someone check it out.

There are several articles online instructing us how to inspect our meter base and signs to look for. I have read one or two and they are quite consistent with their instructions. White -electric.com (no relation!) was very easy to read and understand.

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WHAT'S YOURS? WHAT'S OURS? AND WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR MAINTAINING IT

A meter base is the metal box that houses the meter on your home or business. They are usually located on the side of the home or business or on a post or pole in the yard.

The meter base is owned by you, the customer, and is your responsibility to maintain. Over time, a meter base can rust and become unsafe. Be sure to inspect your meter base occasionally and look for areas of rust. A rusted-out meter base can cause an electrical short, overheating and potentially causing a fire or an unplanned power outage. Keep in mind that Central Lincoln must have access to your meter at all times. Please do not build enclosures around the meter or meter base and keep vegetation out of the way.

Central Lincoln maintains the wires and facilities that deliver electricity and the meters that measure electricity use. The diagram below shows a home electrical system and who is responsible for what. Central Lincoln maintains the items in blue. The customer maintains the items in red. (Note: This diagram will appear on the CLPUD website).

Please contact a licensed electrician if you plan to repair, replace, or upgrade electrical equipment like your meter base. Never attempt to access your meter base or the electric meter yourself."

Meter: Central Lincoln owns/maintains the meter that measures electricity use.

Meter Base: You own and are responsible for the metal box that houses the meter.

Transformer: Central Lincoln owns/maintains the transformer mounted on a pole (3A) or pad (3B).


Cable Inside Conduit: Central Lincoln owns/maintains the cable inside the conduit from the transformer to the meter base.

Customer Conduit: You own/maintain the conduit from the meter base to just below the ground, including the 90-degree elbow at the bottom.

Central Lincoln Conduit: Central Lincoln owns/maintains the conduit from the 90-degree elbow back to the source.

Service Hand Hole: Central Lincoln owns the open-bottomed junction box with removable lid that provides for installation and maintenance of electrical connectors.

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AT THE MOVIES

The Genre for this month is DRAMA

Lillies of the Field -- 1963 When traveling African-American handyman Homer Smith (Sidney Poitier) stops by a farm in rural Arizona, he is welcomed by a group of Roman Catholic nuns who have emigrated from Germany. Realizing that the farm needs a lot of work, Homer takes on a number of repair projects for the women, who are led by the headstrong Mother Maria (Lilia Skala). Impressed by Homer's kindness and strong work ethic, the nuns come to believe that he has been sent by God to help build them a chapel.

The Manchurian Candidate -- 1962 Near the end of the Korean War, a platoon of U.S. soldiers is captured by communists and brainwashed. Following the war, the platoon is returned home, and Sergeant Raymond Shaw (Laurence Harvey) is lauded as a hero by the rest of his platoon. However, the platoon commander, Captain Bennett Marco (Frank Sinatra), finds himself plagued by strange nightmares and, together with fellow soldier Allen Melvin (James Edwards), races to uncover a terrible plot.

Memories of a Geisha -- 2005 In the 1920s, 9-year-old Chiyo (Suzuka Ohgo) gets sold to a geisha house. There, she is forced into servitude, receiving nothing in return until the house's ruling hierarchy determines if she is of high enough quality to service the clientele -- men who visit and pay for conversation, dance and song. After rigorous years of training, Chiyo becomes Sayuri (Ziyi Zhang), a geisha of incredible beauty and influence. Life is good for Sayuri, but World War II is about to disrupt the peace.

Midnight in the Garden of Good and Evil -- 1997 This is a 1997 American mystery thriller film directed and produced by Clint Eastwood and starring John Cusack and Kevin Spacey. The screenplay by John Lee Hancock was based on John Berendt's 1994 book of the same name and follows the story of antiques dealer Jim Williams, on trial for the killing of a male prostitute who was his lover. The multiple trials depicted in Berendt's book are combined into one trial for the film.

The Mrs. Bradley's Mysteries -- 1998 British TV Series; This crime drama series is based on the character created in the writings of Gladys Mitchell. Diana Rigg stars as the stylish lady sleuth Mrs. Adela Bradley, who solves mysteries with her loyal chauffeur, George Moody, played by Neil Dudgeon. On the road in a Roll Royce, the glamorous socialite and her assistant use their investigative skills to uncover family secrets, discover motives, and reveal culprits. Aided by her attuned observational talents, Mrs. Bradley never fails to catch the criminal behind every mystery she faces.

Nicholas Nickleby -- 2002 After the death of the family patriarch, young Nicholas Nickleby (Charlie Hunnam) and his family are left with no means to survive. The family is forced to split up, and Nicholas lands in a school run by brutish principal Wackford Squeers (Jim Broadbent). Eventually, Nicholas makes a friend named Smike (Jamie Bell), and the two boys break free. Nicholas reunites with his family but learns he must now defend his sister from the advances of menacing suitor Sir Mulberry Hawk (Edward Fox).

Rebecca -- **1940** Story of a young woman who marries a fascinating widower only to find out that she must live in the shadow of his former wife, Rebecca, who died mysteriously several years earlier. The young wife must come to grips with the terrible secret of her handsome, cold husband, Max De Winter (Laurence Olivier). She must also deal with the jealous, obsessed Mrs. Danvers (Judith Anderson), the housekeeper, who will not accept her as the mistress of the house.

The Shadow -- 1994 Set in 1930s New York, a reformed criminal becomes a superhero. With the aid of a beautiful female friend, a playboy millionaire with a dark past sets out to bring the evil Shiwan Khan to justice. His quarry, who is determined to attain world domination, is a deadly descendant of Genghis Khan and will not surrender without a fight.

Zulu Dawn – 1979 Follow-up to the historical epic `Zulu', which documents the events preceding the battle in the original film and the political situation at the time. Taking the Zulu's defiant stance on tribal customs as a declaration of war, the British commander sends in hundreds of British troops in order to squash the African warriors with superior fire power, leading to the death of 1,500 British soldiers.

HAVE E-BIKE, WILL TRAVEL

Need help? Do you want to know how to tune your derailleur or adjust your brakes? Should I consider a mid-drive or hub motor? What the heck is a mid-drive or hub motor!? What do all those numbers mean? Do you have flat tire prevention and repair questions? I usually can answer questions about batteries and electrical systems, many e-bike/e-trike or bike/trike parts and repair issues, and most basic adjustments for cyclists. Absolutely NO EXPERI-ENCE necessary. Curiosity invited.

I have designed a program to help understand the basics of E-Bikes/Trikes with visuals, demonstrations, instruction, and hands-on practice. I have a motor with the parts separated to show the hidden pieces and a complete running unit showing how the fundamental elements are connected: the throttle will be functional for "testing." Some e-bikes and an e-trike build will be available to see, but unfortunately are not for attendees to ride. After a brief but thoroughly engaging introduction, instruction, and demonstration(s), expect to get some dirty fingers as I stand aside and let you get down to the nitty gritty.

My tools will be yours to use, but bringing your own pair of pliers, a philips (#s 1, 2, 3) and regular screwdriver, any metric wrenches (8mm, 10mm, 13mm and 15mm especially), and some bicycle tire irons would help immensely. I can help anyone assess their battery or wiring but such issues are beyond the scope of this event except for a demonstration of safe wiring techniques.

POTLUCK RECIPE

Sweet n' Sour Meatballs

1-1/2 lb Hamburger

Sauce:

1 can sliced pineapple
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoon corn starch
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1 tablespoon soy sauce
1/4 teaspoon ginger

1 beef bouillon cube

- 1. Form hamburger into meatballs and brown then sprinkle with salt and pepper.
- 2. Make sauce: Drain pineapple into 2 cup measuring cup and add enough water to make 1-1/2 cups.
- 3. Ina saucepan, combine sugar, cornstarch, and ginger. Mix well. Add pineapple juice, vinegar, soy sauce and bouillon cube. Bring to a boil; stirring constantly. Boil 2 minutes. Put meatballs in a crockpot and pour sauce over the top and simmer about 2 hours. Cut pineapple into chunks and add after about 1 hour.

Serve with rice.

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RHODY DRIVE REALIGNMENT AND IMPROVEMENT PROJECT UPDATES

WOW! The Rhody Drive Realignment is moving along fast, but safety is of utmost importance to the workers, the residents of Florence, and the City. The contractor, K&E Excavating, has asked that we remind the community that Rhododendron Drive is closed during construction unless people are accessing a residence, the Oregon Coast Humane Society, or the Lane County Transfer Station.

This closure includes bicyclists and pedestrians, as well as vehicular traffic. They have seen an increase in bicyclists and pedestrians trying to pass through the corridor. This is unsafe in an active construction zone. Please help keep the construction zone safe and adhere to the road closed signs and the instructions from the crews working.

Some of the completions of the project during the month of May have been: installation of the Ultrablock precast concrete retaining wall #1; various portions of the new stormwater system; bringing in a 2nd crew they began asphalt grinding from Wildwinds to New Hope Lane; 24-inch drilling of the Siuslaw Village Sewer Pump Station wet well for the new 18-inch gravity sewer line; water tie-ins at Marine Manner, New Hope Lane, and Wildwinds (the new water system is online and operational); and utility poles were relocated by CLPUD.

Did you know? Due to the depth of the new sewer main line, the contractor encountered what we refer to as 'blow sand.' Blow sand is an extremely dry and fine sand which is not stable and flows like water into the trench. This required the contractor to use extra care and driving 1-inch-thick metal sheets alongside their trench box in order to keep the 'blow sand' from filling the trench and making the excavation extremely wide. With the additional care comes time and slows the production rate (amount of pipe material that the contractor can install). Given the circumstances the contractor is still advancing the project in a timely manner.



"Look up, Florence! Don't miss the beautiful banners that director of tourism development Mitzi Hathaway designed and Sign Stop worked so hard to produce and install along with Florence City Public Works and Central Lincoln PUD," said Florence Area Chamber of Commerce president/CEO Bettina Hannigan.

Hathaway created two different versions of the banners. Stephanie Cunningham, owner of the Sign Stop in Florence, arranged for printing. Stephanie's partner, Bernie Cunningham, who also owns The Copier Doctor worked with the Florence Public Works Department to hang several large banners and many smaller versions along Highway 101, in Historic Old Town, and at the entrance to Three Rivers Casino Resort.

"This is the continuation of our banner project that began in 2021—in harmony with the Highway 101 improvements and our annual hanging of those 150plus magnificent flower baskets that adorn Old Town and Highway 101 from the bridge to Highway 126; but the banner project goes farther, all the way up to Fred Meyer," Hannigan explained. "It's also a way to bring a little joy, show some civic pride, and give all drivers and pedestrians a positive impression of our community. And all of that helps commerce in our area."

Tourism has grown to a \$320 million boost to the area's economy, now employing about 2700 of the 5100 local workers. The average tourist spends more than \$200 per day when they stay in town overnight. Four million trips are counted in Florence on Highway 101 every year and the banners are intended to capture those visitors' attention, and their vacation dollars, for the local economy.

"The City Council was supportive of the banner project and approved the project in May of 2021. The Florence Area Chamber of Commerce is the marketing agent for the City of Florence and the City sees the raising of the banners along the highways and in Old Town as an extension of the existing Florence marketing messages of 'Shop, Eat, Stay, and Play here in Oregon's Coastal Playground.' It's a smart investment and tourism asset addition," said Florence city manager Erin Reynolds when the program launched.

"It's been a very careful, deliberate, collaborative process and we are thrilled with the results." explained Hannigan. "We were excited to launch—and sustain—a program that catches drivers' attention, gets them to slow down a little, and helps direct them to stop, shop, eat, play, and stay here in Florence.

"Visitors will see our obvious community pride and understand that there is a bounty of fun things to do in and around Florence. They'll see why this is indeed Oregon's Coastal Playground," added Hannigan, "We're proud of the partnership between the Chamber, the City, Central Lincoln, the businesses, civic clubs, and individuals that have invested in this program."

Activity Committee: The Activity Committee is made up of resident volunteers who organize and put on activities for residents. The committee raises funds throughout the year by putting on events. The ACC issues permits to owners who wish to alter the structure of their homes and buildings; they may recommend variances on behalf of lot owners, and also recommend to the board that fines be assessed against owners who fail to comply with design standards and restrictions.

Bingo Committee: The Bingo Committee provides residents with the opportunity to play bingo and socialize. The Bingo Committee operates bingo games exclusively for residents and their guests and is Not for Profit. The committee members facilitate the Bingo games every other Saturday night.

Communications Committee: This committee is made up of resident volunteers who write, edit, and prep articles for the monthly newsletter as well as securing advertising for the newsletter. The Committee manages the website and also manages the email communications for both regular and emergency email communications as well as a Facebook page. They work to keep the Community well informed of activities, events and happenings in the Community.

Finance Committee: The Finance Committee helps the board fulfill its fiscal and oversight responsibilities. It reviews and recommends approval of the annual financial budget prepared by staff; ensures that all financial reports prepared by staff are timely; regularly reviews financial results and ensures the organization is operating at the highest level of transparency. The committee annually reviews the independent CPA results of the last financial statements and the contents of the prepared management letter. It also oversees the management of organization-wide financial assets.

Property Committee: The Property Committee is responsible for advising the board on work must be done to maintain the community's common property. The committee annually submits to the board a recommendation for projects that should be completed the following year. The committee also researches physical problems that occur to the facilities and recommends solutions.
