MAIL ISSUES

Mail theft has been on the rise in the area, not only in Greentrees but in the Florence and Mapleton communities, as well. In some cases, incoming or outgoing checks are stolen and 'washed' or 'bleached,' and a new payee and amount are entered; these checks can be and are cashed since they are actual checks. According to an article in a recent AARP publication, the thieves are now 'check cooking': using technology to scan or take a photo of checks, altering them with some readily available software, then either print them or use the banks' mobile apps to deposit the checks.

Even if you don't receive or send checks in outgoing mail, the thieves can get a lot of personal information from your mail. Bank and credit card statements have your account numbers, names, and balances. Retirement statements have your income. Even newsletters and mailings from your old employers can give thieves information you may not want out and can help them steal from you.



While we may not stop these thieves completely, there are some things

that we can do ourselves to help prevent your incoming and outgoing mail from being stolen. Please see tips on ways to protect your incoming mail on page 13. These tips won't prevent theft from totally happening – thieves always are one step ahead of us! But they will help as much as we can to limit it.

At Greentrees, the board is investigating ways to help. We have received an outgoing mail tote from the Post Office. This tote is in the office for you to place your outgoing mail in if you wish.

County Transfer offers **Bear Proof cans.** The cost of these cans is \$10 a month, which is billed quarterly at \$30 per billing cycle. You must call them at 541-997-8233 to set up an individual account. If you don't have a secure place to store your garbage, this is a really good idea. If you put your garbage out the night before garbage day and a bear or other animal gets into it you will be fined if it happens repeatedly. FLORENCE FEUD-UPDATE



There were 4 teams that went to the lightning round and GTV came in 2nd.

This was a fund raiser to support Florence Food Share (FFS). It turned out to be a successful event and they plan to do it again next year. The event sold out and there was a silent auction, which also helped in collecting funds for FFS. 
ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE (ACC) REMINDER

This is the time that people start trimming their shrubbery and doing their yard work. Lot owners need to remember that we have dumpsters for resident's lot trimmings. The trimmings must be no longer than 3 feet in length and 6 inches in diameter. Please be courteous about the amount you place in the dumpster. They are not there for your whole lot clearing. Pickup loads should go to the dump. Residents who use contractors, please be sure that they carry your load away to the dump. If those loads are deposited in the dumpster you, the resident can get a fine.

Please don't throw any clippings or debris in the commons. That can result in a fine as well. For any clearing or cleaning out of the greenbelt, please talk to your neighbor about your plans, so they are prepared when they see you do the work. Neighbors need to understand that the owner has the right to clear their greenbelt and then replant with trees or shrubbery of their choice.

If you are considering construction projects around your house, you must first contact the ACC committee to see if you need a permit. Some projects require a City permit as well as a Greentrees permit. Let's all work together to make Greentrees a beautiful place to live.

But when they're kicked out of a strip club after the owner, Porky (Chuck Mitchell), takes their money, they plot revenge. While they try to get back at him, they deal with other teen troubles, including Pee Wee's worries that his "equipment" is shrinking, their sexually opinionated gym teacher (Kim Cattrall), and a spy hole in the girl's locker room.

Scary Movie 4 -- 2006 Dim-witted Cindy Campbell (Anna Faris) and her sex-crazed friend, Brenda (Regina Hall), team up with cute-but-clueless Tom Ryan (Craig Bierko) to save the world from a hostile alien invasion, with hints of "War of the Worlds," "Saw II," "Million Dollar Baby" and "The Village." Celebrity cameos include Carmen Electra, Shaquille O'Neal, Dr. Phil McGraw, Bill Pullman, Molly Shannon, and Michael Madsen.

Sitting Pretty -- 1948 The film stars Robert Young, Maureen O'Hara, and Clifton Webb, about a family who hires the mysterious Lynn Belvedere to babysit their rowdy children.

TIPS ON MAIL FRAUD

- Check your mail daily. Leaving mail in your mailbox overnight is an invitation for someone to take it.
- Sign up for Informed Delivery at USPS.com This service sends you an email every day you are getting letter mail or packages (except Sunday). It includes a scan of the envelope for letter mail. You can also get notices of packages to be delivered by USPS. The Informed Delivery does not include magazines or flyers.
- Do not put outgoing mail out at night. Your mailbox with the red flag up is a big 'take me' sign to thieves. Wait until the morning to put mail out, take your outgoing mail to the post office, or drop it in the outgoing mail tote in the office.
- Pay your bills online or though automatic payment. It is an adjustment for us seniors to do instead of paying by check, but it is far safer.
- If you MUST write and send a check, some tips from Chase Bank include:
 - Use permanent ink so it is harder to erase
 - Fill out the Payee and Dollar amount space completely, drawing a line to the end of the space
 - Mail checks from the post office
 - Use your bank's mobile app to monitor your accounts and verify the Payee and Amount are what you intended
 - Consider getting your statements electronically as well
- Another option is to get a locking mailbox. Per James, Facilities Manager, these must be no wider than 10", bottom mounted, and black. They can be either metal or plastic. Maintenance staff will install them for you, but residents must purchase the mailboxes themselves. We have had some interest in a particular mailbox that is wide enough to allow receiving prescriptions and boxes the approximate size of check boxes. We are currently getting an order together and will be able to get these mailboxes at a discounted price by buying in bulk. The cost per mailbox will be \$97. RHODY DRIVE REALIGNMENT AND IMPROVEMENT PROJECT UPDATES

During April K&E Excavating started to move on the Rhody Drive Project. This included finishing cleaning up and grubbing the project area, widening of the east side of Rhody Drive, excavating related to the retaining walls, and removing existing utility poles. They have also completed the new water line installation and one of the retaining walls, installed the irrigation system for the land-scape planter for the overlook area. They are installing stormwater infrastructure, installing new water lines and water services and meters for the service is transferred to the new water main, widening the road base, and began construction for the realignment of New Hope Lane. Central Lincoln PUD crews have also been in the area setting the relocated utility poles.

With the construction beginning to realign and reconstruct New Hope Lane, access to Oregon Coast Humane Society and the Lane Country Transfer Station will be available, however, there will be flaggers staged to control traffic.

Motorists can expect some delay in entering and exiting New Hope Lane.

Access to Rhododendron Drive north of 9th Street is restricted except for residents of Greentrees Village and Wildwinds and their guests or for any business to the Lane County Transfer Station and the Oregon Coast Humane Society. If you have business at either of these places, please adhere to the flaggers to keep the crews and public safe during construction.

If you need to get to 35th Street you must use the alternate route, use 9th Street and then Kingwood Street or use Hwy 101, although that will start getting pretty busy soon with the Spring/Summer visitors.

IN PRAISE OF READING AND A HANDY LIBRARY

Whether it's been years or hours since you last read a book, consider this: reading is not only pleasurable, but is believed to reduce stress, improve concentration, enhance knowledge, and increase creativity.

Researchers have found that people who spend a few hours a week reading books live longer than those who don't read, or read only magazine or newspaper articles.

At Greentrees, we have a small clubhouse library. There are no due dates, no fines, and the hours are convenient. Please drop by and take a look at what's available.

The mass market (small) paperbacks are in two large bookcases, divided into genres. Each genre is labeled and shelved alphabetically by author. Opposite is a large section of Mystery, and an even larger section of Romance.

The hardbound books and larger paperback books are shelved as Fiction, followed by Biography, Memoir, and History, and finally, General Nonfiction, all alphabetical by author.

One basic rule to follow, whether returning or donating books: do not re-shelve them, but leave them on the table for the library volunteers to do so.
