Nominations are closed. It is now time to vote for your district representative and alternates from the membership at large. Voting gives you the opportunity to elect district representatives that will represent you on the Greentrees Board of Directors; directors that care about our community, who will be responsible and ethical in the administration of the affairs of the association.

District 2, 4, 6, and 8 owners will receive ballots with the candidates for their district representative and alternate candidates listed. District 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9 owners will receive ballots for alternate candidates only.

Ballots will be mailed to owners at the address on file with the office the week of November 4<sup>th</sup>. Completed ballots must be received in the office by 2:59 PM on December 9<sup>th</sup>. Read the ballot instructions carefully and follow all instructions. IMPORTANT: The lot owner's signature and lot number must be on the back of the self-addressed return envelope for the ballot to be counted.

DO NOT give your ballot to anyone else to turn in. DO NOT include your dues check with your ballot as envelopes will not be opened until ballots are counted after December 9th.

Election results will be announced at the December 17, 2024, board of directors meeting. The new board will be seated at the January 21, 2025, board of directors meeting.

She married a fellow who designed Formula 1 Racing boats, so became a speed boat racer herself, racking up three USA Formula 1 first place titles and two second place titles.

The holiday season is upon us. Halloween is over except for some candy.

It's time to be thankful for all we have.

Time to start thinking about the Giving Tree, which will magically appear in the rec hall before the Thanksgiving Feast.

In 2013 we started collecting toys for children in Florence and donating them to the Soroptimist International give away. That year we had 46 toys.

In 2021, due to Covid, they discontinued the toy give away. That year we donated 230 toys and \$600 to the Florence Police Dept. For those unable to shop (because of Covid) we started an envelope in the Greentrees office for monetary donations. We are continuing that option. Last year that envelope contained \$1,045. The po-



lice use the money to buy generic gift cards for the older children on their list. We had 338 toys.

For the past 2 years, we have had a handmade quilt - designed, made, and generously donated by Diana Lindsley. She has once again provided us with a beautiful quilt. Last year it added \$457 to the envelope.

There are several ways to be part of the fun.

First - place an unwrapped toy under the Giving Tree.

Second - donate to the envelope in the office. Checks made out to the Florence Police Dept.

And third - donate toward the quilt.

Every penny goes to the Florence Police Dept for the children of Florence.

#### The Genre for this month is DRAMA

**Bad Boys II -- 2003:** The drug ecstasy is flowing into Miami, and the police want it stopped. Police Detective Marcus Burnett (Martin Lawrence) and his partner, Mike Lowrey (Will Smith), are just the men to do it. They track the drugs to a Cuban smuggler, Johnny Tapia (Jordi Mollà), who is also involved in a bloody war with Russian and Haitian mobsters. If that isn't bad enough, there's tension between the two cops because Lowrey is romantically involved with Burnett's sister, Syd (Gabrielle Union).

**Battleship -- 2012:** Lt. Alex Hopper (Taylor Kitsch) is a weapons officer aboard the destroyer USS John Paul Jones, while his older brother, Stone (Alexander Skarsgård), is the commanding officer of the USS Sampson. Unknown to Alex, Stone or the rest of the U.S. Navy, alien invaders have arrived on Earth with plans to steal Earth's resources. When a confrontation with the invaders knocks out the Navy's radar capability, American and Japanese forces must work together to find a way to save the planet.

**Beautiful -- 2000:** Mona Hibbard steadily advances as an American beauty queen in spite of her less than congenial temperament. Her best friend from childhood, Ruby, has the patience of a saint, which is why she's the one person who is willing to help Mona pursue her ambition. Ruby even helps her to hide the secret that would completely derail Mona's plan to capture the "Miss American Miss" title: an illegitimate daughter, Vanessa. Her biggest obstacle is losing her killer instinct for her maternal instinct.

**Because of WINN-DIXIE** – **2005:** Abandoned by her mother years ago, Opal (AnnaSophia Robb), a 10year-old girl, moves with her preacher father (Jeff Daniels) to a small town in Florida. Lonely and missing her old friends, Opal is ecstatic to find companionship with a rambunctious little dog she names Winn-Dixie, after the store where she found the pup. With Winn-Dixie's help, Opal befriends several colorful townsfolk (Cicely Tyson, Eva Marie Saint, Dave Matthews) and even begins mending her relationship with her father.

**Beyond the Sea -- 2004:** As a boy, Bobby Darin (Kevin Spacey) nearly died from rheumatic fever. While it left him with a weakened heart, it didn't weaken his desire to become the most popular singer in the country. Knowing that he's living on borrowed time, Bobby works nonstop to conquer the pop and jazz worlds with hits like "Splish Splash" and "Mack the Knife." But as the '60s come into full swing, Bobby sees his style of singing fall out of favor, and his marriage to actress Sandra Dee (Kate Bosworth) suffer.

**Blink -- 1993:** Blinded at the abusive hands of her mother as a young girl, Emma Brody (Madeleine Stowe) is now a musician in Chicago. After an operation, she partly regains her sight, but sometimes she can remember things only hours after first seeing them. When she thinks she sees the person who murdered her neighbor, the police detective John Hallstrom (Aidan Quinn) becomes involved both with the case and with Emma. Now the killer is after Emma, and John struggles to protect her as they unravel the mystery.

**The Bounty -- 1984:** Captain Bligh (Anthony Hopkins) struggles to restore discipline among the crew of the HMS Bounty after the ship has an extended furlough in Tahiti. After the captain doles out floggings and other physical punishments, the crew mutinies, led by Bligh's former close friend, Fletcher Christian (Mel Gibson). Unable to return to their tropical paradise, the mutineers find themselves stranded, while Bligh and his faithful crew members embark on a dangerous journey to the Dutch East Indies.

**Bridge to Terabithia** – **2007:** The life of Jesse (Josh Hutcherson), an adolescent, changes when he befriends Leslie (AnnaSophia Robb), the class outsider. The children create an imaginary world called Terabithia, which is inhabited by all manner of magical creatures. Though difficulties fill their ordinary lives, Jesse and Leslie rule as king and queen in Terabithia. Soon one of the friends must draw on the strength of their imaginary kingdom to cope with a tragedy.

**Constantine - 2005:** As a suicide survivor, demon hunter John Constantine (Keanu Reeves) has literally been to hell and back -- and he knows that when he dies, he's got a one-way ticket to Satan's realm unless he can earn enough goodwill to climb God's stairway to heaven. While helping policewoman Angela Dodson (Rachel Weisz) investigate her identical twin's apparent suicide, Constantine becomes caught up in a supernatural plot involving both demonic and angelic forces. Based on the DC/Vertigo "Hellblazer" comics.

**Defiance -- 2008:** In 1941, Nazi soldiers are slaughtering Eastern European Jews by the thousands. Three brothers, Tuvia (Daniel Craig), Zus (Liev Schreiber) and Asael (Jamie Bell), manage to escape and take refuge in the forest where they played in childhood. Seeking a way to avenge the deaths of their loved ones, the brothers turn their daily struggle for survival into a battle against the Nazis. As news of their exploits spreads, others join the fray, willing to risk their lives for even brief freedom.



I am still standing!!!....

After a year of being discredited and ridiculed by the current majority of this board, I'm still standing and ready to continue with my work to make GTV more financially stable. During my prior 18 months on the board as Vice President and President, I was instrumental in limiting your dues increases to \$15.00 as Vice President for 2023 and \$5.00 as President for 2024. This years' board has failed you, proposing a \$49.00 increase, one of the highest increases ever.

I will push for a freeze on \$50,000 of the wage increases, instead making wage increases comparable to previous years and I will complete my work in developing a proper insurance package. This will reduce our dues next year by at least \$7-9.00. In the short term, I will propose we implement the \$1000 insurance increase for employees that I had in last year's budget (never implemented) to ensure our employees have a total of \$2000 in interim coverage.

I will work with proven negotiators, such as Tom Benson, to correct where your 2024 Board has failed to negotiate. We were instrumental in negotiating new rates with the city twice previously and are confident we can reduce the \$28.00/month dues increase for water and wastewater costs.

If we roll up our sleeves, next year's budget can still be decreased within the first month of the new board being seated and we can realign the budget to possibly limit your dues increase to \$15.00 to \$20.00 for next year.

I'm ready to go back to work for our community and use my expertise to fix the financial problems created by the 2024 Board and move us forward to a future where everyone can afford to live in Greentrees Village.
