GTV ANNUAL MEETING

CONSERVE WATER, IT'S EXPENSIVE

In early May, the City of Florence informed GTV that in their transition to a new accounting and billing software system they found that the way GTV was being charged for wastewater (sewer) treatment was incorrect, to GTV's advantage for several years. While the City will not be back billing GTV for this error, they will be correcting how GTV is charged for wastewater treatment going forward. That change is going to have a profound effect on our monthly HOA dues.

As background, both water consumption and wastewater treatment are quantified in cubic feet (CF). A CF of water is 7.5 gallons. The bill rates for clean water coming in and for wastewater treatment are different. The bill rate for wastewater treatment is almost 4X the amount of clean water coming into GTV. The water consumption rate is 0.023 / CF, the wastewater treatment rate is 0.087 / CF.

The City's older system correctly accounted for the CF of water consumed by GTV, no adjustment was needed there. Our wastewater CF, however, was not reflective of the water consumed. It was based on an entry that was hard coded into their system several years ago. For example, in June 2023, the hard coded amount for the wastewater portion of the West bill was 72,920 CF, the consumption amount was 254,500 CF.

Water coming into GTV doesn't equal water going into the wastewater treatment system. Some of the water consumed by GTV is used externally and doesn't wind up in the wastewater system. Per the U.S. EPA, the nationwide average is 30% of the water going to a residence is used externally. An analysis of GTV's consumption pattern for the last five years with City provided data, shows that GTV's water consumption almost doubles in the summer (May-Oct) from the winter (Nov-Apr). The Genre for this month is ADVETURES

Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull (2008) It's the height of the Cold War, and famous archaeologist Indiana Jones (Harrison Ford), returning from his latest adventure, finds out his job at Marshall College is in jeopardy. He meets Mutt (Shia La Beouf), a young man who wants Indy to help him find the legendary Crystal Skull of Akator, and the pair set out for Peru. However, deadly agent Irina Spalko (Cate Blanchett) is searching for the powerful artifact, too, because the Soviets believe it can help them conquer the world.

Jungle Book (2016) Raised by a family of wolves since birth, Mowgli (Neel Sethi) must leave the only home he's ever known when the fearsome tiger Shere Khan (Idris Elba) unleashes his mighty roar. Guided by a nonosense panther (Ben Kingsley) and a free-spirited bear (Bill Murray), the young boy meets an array of jungle animals, including a slithery python and a smooth-talking ape. Along the way, Mowgli learns valuable life lessons as his epic journey of self-discovery leads to fun and adventure.

The Last Mimzy (2007) Siblings Emma (Rhiannon Leigh Wryn) and Noah (Chris O'Neil) discover a box full of strange items they believe are toys. As the children play with the objects, their parents (Joely Richardson, Timothy Hutton) and a teacher (Rainn Wilson) notice that their intelligence level is growing by leaps and bounds. Emma reveals that her favorite toy, a stuffed rabbit called Mimzy, talks to her and has an important message from the future.

Lemony Snicket's A Series of Unfortunate Events (2004) After the three young Baudelaire siblings are left orphaned by a fire in their mansion, they are carted off to live with their distant relative, Count Olaf (Jim Carrey). Unfortunately, Olaf is a cruel, scheming man only after the inheritance that the eldest Baudelaire, Violet (Emily Browning), is set to receive. The children escape and find shelter with their quirky Uncle Monty (Billy Connolly) and, subsequently, their phobic Aunt Josephine (Meryl Streep), but Olaf is never far behind.

The Mask (1994) When timid bank clerk Stanley Ipkiss (Jim Carrey) discovers a magical mask containing the spirit of the Norse god Loki, his entire life changes. While wearing the mask, Ipkiss becomes a supernatural playboy exuding charm and confidence which allows him to catch the eye of local nightclub singer Tina Carlyle (Cameron Diaz). Unfortunately, under the mask's influence, Ipkiss also robs a bank, which angers junior crime lord Dorian Tyrell (Peter Greene), whose goons get blamed for the heists.

Mr. Magorium's Wonder Emporium (2007) Magic flows freely through the walls and toys within the Wonder Emporium. But when Mr. Magorium (Dustin Hoffman), the store's 243-year-old proprietor, decides to turn the reins over to his manager Molly Mahoney (Natalie Portman), mysterious changes creep over the Emporium. Molly and Henry (Jason Bateman), an accountant, must discover the magic within themselves if they are ever to revive the now-quiet toys.

Narnia The Lion, The Voyage of the Dawn Treader (2010) Visiting their annoying cousin, Eustace, Lucy (Georgie Henley) and Edmund Pevensie (Skandar Keynes) come across a painting of a majestic ship called the Dawn Treader. Suddenly, the painting comes to life and draws the youths into Narnia, where they meet their old friend, King Caspian (Ben Barnes). Caspian is on a quest to find the seven lost Lords of Telmar, whose swords will save Narnia from an evil green mist that enslaves men's minds and bodies.

Narnia The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe (2005) During the World War II bombings of London, four English siblings are sent to a country house where they will be safe. One day Lucy (Georgie Henley) finds a wardrobe that transports her to a magical world called Narnia. After coming back, she soon returns to Narnia with her brothers, Peter (William Moseley) and Edmund (Skandar Keynes), and her sister, Susan (Anna Popplewell). There they join the magical lion, Aslan (Liam Neeson), in the fight against the evil White Witch, Jadis (Tilda Swinton).

Night at the Museum Battle of the Smithsonian (2009) Once the night guard at the Museum of Natural History, Larry Daley (Ben Stiller) is now a successful purveyor of infomercial products. Soon after learning that his museum friends have been shipped to the Smithsonian Institution, Larry receives a distress call from Jedediah, who warns him that four of history's greatest villains have come to life and are planning to take over the Smithsonian first, then the world. AUTOMATED CHEMICAL SYSTEM FOR POOL

GREENTREES RV PARK: MAKE YOUR RESERVATIONS EARLY

We have a lot of new homeowners here in Greentrees that may not realize we have an RV park. The RV Park is not open to the public; it is an amenity for homeowners allowing family and friends with RVs to stay close when visiting. RV Park spaces are limited and reservations fill up early, especially May to October when tourists flock to the Oregon Coast.

As owners, you are responsible for ensuring your guests follow the RV Park rules. For your reference, the GTV RV Park Rules are provided below:

A. Everyone using the Greentrees Village RV Park shall be an owner, a resident of Greentrees Village, or the guest of a Greentrees resident or owner. The owner/resident shall make park reservations on behalf of their guests. The owner/resident is ultimately responsible for their guest's actions, fees, or any damage they may cause.

B. Guests shall register with the Camp Host and pay the necessary fee at time of arrival.

C. The sponsoring owner/resident will provide RV Park guests with a Greentrees gate card or key fob, which will allow them access to Greentrees, use of the clubhouse and other facilities. RV Park guests may use the clubhouse family changing rooms and showers during regular clubhouse hours. No guests under the age of 18 shall use the recreation hall facilities, therapy pool, sauna, adult pool, exercise room or coffee room.

D. RV Park guests shall follow the same rules as other Greentrees residents. The Camp Host shall provide each guest with pertinent Park rules.

E. The maximum initial length of stay in the Park is 14 days. A stay may be extended by the Park Host if openings are available.

F. RV Park guests may use the clubhouse Family changing rooms and showers during business hours but no one under the age of 18 shall use the Recreation Hall facilities, therapy pool, sauna, adult pool, exercise room, or Coffee Room. Guests shall carry a key fob or card when using the facilities.

G. The current park rates are: \$30.00 +3.75 tax for a total of \$33.75 per night. We have 8 spaces (3 pull-thru and 5 back in) with water, electric, sewer, and WiFi.

Quiet Hours are from 10 PM to 7 AM. Every effort shall be made to avoid disturbing residents with construction noise, loud talking, high radio or television volume, and other loud sounds.

CONSERVE WATER, IT'S EXPENSIVE (Continued)

This is a very rough approximation of a reduction factor that could be applied, but other factors may come into play. The City is currently analyzing GTV's consumption patterns to determine what reduction factor should be applied to our consumption CF to arrive at the wastewater CF. GTV anticipates receiving that reduction factor prior to finalizing the 2025 budget.

That reduction factor will determine how large an impact the shift from the old hard coded entry to a percentage of the consumption CF will be to the wastewater portion of GTV's utility bill. However, regardless of the reduction factor, there will be a notable increase in the monthly HOA dues. While the exact amount is still to be determined, it would be prudent to anticipate that this change to GTV's utilities costs will very likely be in the vicinity of \$30/month and it is not the only increase that will impact the 2025 monthly HOA dues.

With the wastewater CF now being truly reflective of GTV's consumption, it is essential that homeowners are judicious in their water usage. That usage has just gotten a lot more expensive. In the coming months, there will be more articles on water conservation options that homeowners can utilize to help keep these costs down.

The event takes place at the Florence Events Center, where the festival will unfold in the nearly 8000 sq. ft. exhibit hall. The address is 715 Quince Street (one block east of Highway 101), in Florence, with plenty of free parking on site. Admission prices vary with access to workshops and speakers. Youth 18 and under are admitted free.

Produced by the all-volunteer Florence Arts, Culture & Entertainment (FACE) nonprofit, this Festival has a proud heritage of gathering the best of Lane County's (and beyond) book-centric people to an in-person event.

ECLECTIC ÄRTÊFACTS EXHIBIT AT FLORENCE CHAMBER IN JUNE

"Herons, Fish, and Fun!" is the coastal-nature inspired theme this month at the Florence Area Chamber of Commerce's Visitor Center's art gallery. The exhibit celebrates the beauty and vibrancy of nature, particularly focusing on the elements which bring joy and inspiration.

Possibly the most remarkable piece is the Edge Sculpture, based on a French Bulldog, which has enjoyed a long history as a companion dog. This lovely creature is designed and sculpted in England by Matt Buckley at his studios in Shropshire. Edge Sculpture is a collection influenced by style rather than subject. The mix of form, light, and texture gives a unique feel to each stunning sculpture. Made from stone and resin, hand painted and signed by the artist," says exhibitor Shelly Medeiros, owner of Ärtêfacts gift shop and gallery in Florence. "Visitors will love how fun and exciting this exhibit is with new items daily and always unique!"

Annual Reserve Study

Oregon law requires that Homeowner Associations (HOA) conduct an annual assessment of the physical assets owned in common by the HOA. The annual assessment of the condition of an HOA's common assets is catalogued in what is called a Reserve Study (RS). This requirement is in place to protect the homeowners' financial investment in their common property. The intent is to ensure the HOA knows the condition of its common assets, plans for their upkeep, and sets funds aside in a reserve account to maintain the community's common property in a safe and sustainable condition.

You are all familiar with the obvious above ground common assets such as the Office, Rec Hall, swimming pools, and roadways. Many of you are becoming familiar with the below ground assets as the saddles that connect your water lines to the main water lines are replaced. GTV owns those below ground assets – the main water supply lines and sewer lines – and is responsible for their upkeep.

The Property Committee is currently overseeing this year's RS and is working closely with the Maintenance Dept. in its conduct. This year GTV purchased a software program to conduct the RS internally. In the Fall of each year, the Property Committee uses the RS to prepare the Reserve Spend for the following year. The Reserve Spend identifies and quantifies the common assets that will be addressed in that year. Like the annual budget the Reserve Spend is approved by the Board.

As a key part of the annual budget, a portion of the monthly dues along with investment interest is placed in GTV's reserve account to cover these costs. In 2024, this amount was \$472.5K. The reserve account is used to pay for the work identified in the Reserve Spend.

As GTV turns the corner on a half century, many of its original assets are nearing or at the end of their service life. The objective of the Reserve Study is to ensure we remain aware of the condition of our common assets and the objective of the reserve account is to ensure there are sufficient funds to maintain those assets.


