#### **ELECTION TIME!**

It is time for elections for district representatives to the Board of Directors. If you have wanted to become involved in the running of the Homeowner's Association, now is your chance.

In even numbered years, representatives for districts 2, 4, 6, & 8 are nominated and elected. District representatives are elected for a two-year term, taking office in January. There are also four alternates elected yearly. The alternates are elected for one-year term; they do not sit on the board unless a seat opens due to a current board member resigning or being unable to serve . If appointed to the board to fulfill a vacancy, the alternate fulfills the remainder of the vacated term.

District representatives must be an owner in good standing and a member of the district. Alternates must be an owner in good standing and can be from any district. District representatives are elected by the members of their district only. Alternates are elected by the community. Only owners can vote.

Nominations will open on Sept. 18 at 9:30 AM. Nominations close at 2:59 PM on Oct 28. Nominations will not be accepted after this day and time. To file a nomination, please see the office for the appropriate form (District Representative or Alternate). Yes, it is ok to nominate yourself.

Candidate statements of up to 250 words will be accepted to be published in the November newsletter and the website. Candidates are not required to submit a statement for publication; however, it is a good way to provide information about yourself, and why you are running. A candidate forum may be held in early November to meet the candidates, learn about them and ask questions. Candidates are not required to attend.

#### VOLUNTEERS-FRANK VIGNA AND JUDY CHANDLER

This is a love story. Frank Vigna and Judy Chandler met each other in a gym in Berkeley, California where they both worked out. On the tenth anniversary of their first date, they got married and have been together for 30 years.

Before that first meet up, Frank spent some time as a small business owner, performing home maintenance and repair. He also spent some time in seminary, studying to be a priest. That led to his work in prison ministries. Later he switched to medical missions as an EMT. Those missions took him to some exotic and troubled locales: Iraq, the Congo, Ecuador, the Amazon Basin, and the Andes.

Judy was an elementary school teacher for 40 years (K-3). Under her direction, her classrooms collected supplies for the schools near Frank's postings. Her students exchanged photos and sometimes letters with penpals in the Spanish-speaking countries. They had "Fridays with Frank," where he shared the creepy crawlies and spiders and snakes native to where he was stationed. Judy used his travels to inspire geography lessons and language lessons for her classes. They even created a cable TV program, "Amazon Elementary," that answered USA kids' questions about life for kids in Ecuador.

Judy and Frank's house is full of beautiful souvenirs of his travels, including a wall of those creepy crawlies! They fell in love with Florence after visiting here, rented for 4 years, then bought their current home. "We love it here," Judy said. "It's paradise!"

Both Frank and Judy are hospice volunteers. Until COVID, they also volunteered at the Humane Society. For years before COVID they also participated in lively music gatherings in private homes that led them to play at the GTV Oktober Music Fests. Judy strums the ukulele and Frank the guitar.

They are members of GERT and serve in the Radio Club, too. When the call went out for volunteers to paint the GTV fire hydrants, Frank and Judy got busy, cleaning the hydrants with steel brushes, and painting them the very visible bright yellow you see today. Both also volunteer on the Village Voice Folding Crew.

Frank is the resident instructor for Tai Chi in Greentrees Village every Monday and Wednesday morning at 9. Already a student of martial arts, he began his Tai Chi training in 2010. #### **GREENTREES EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (GERT)**

September is National Preparedness Month, helping to raise awareness in the steps individuals can take to be ready for a disaster. Everyone has a role to play when it comes to preparing for a disaster and emergency.

By knowing what common disasters, you may face living in your community, can help you to know how to prepare correctly and survive

Questions to ask yourself?

- What resources do I currently have access to that I could use in the event of an emergency or if I need to evacuate?
- How do I currently address my basic needs (food, water, shelter, etc...) and how will this change during an emergency?
- Do I have an emergency plan?
- Do I have an emergency kit?
- Do I have my daily medical needs met if displaced longer than expected?
- Do I have food and water for myself and my family?
- Do I have food and water for my pets?
- Do I have enough supplies at home if I cannot access services for a while?
- Is my phone/contact list up to date? Do I have a written copy?
- What is my communication plan if I lose cell phone, landline and internet service?
- Do I have my medications list? A complete list of your medications with the drs who prescribed and phone numbers.
- Do I have a copy of mywill? Do I have a will?
- Do I have a copy of all important documents?
- Do I know my neighborhood's emergency plan?
- Do I know my city, county or states emergency plan?

GTV has an emergency plan all residents should be familiar with what to expect in the event of an emergency. All residents will play a huge role in the survival of themselves and others.

#### **NEW AND AMENDED RULES**

The Board has recently passed the following new and amended rules.

At the June 28 Special Board meeting, 4 rules were amended and one new rule passed.

<u>Rule #2 Rental Properties</u> had the time-period for registration changed from 30 days to 14 days. Owners are responsible to ensure the renters register at the Office within 14 days of occupancy. The renters will receive a copy of the current rules and regulations and are required to sign an acknowledgement that they received the rules. Renters are also required to complete the Renter's Registration packet within 30 days and show evidence that one or more residents is 55 years of age or older. Renters must also complete the Emergency Information Sheet.

<u>Rule # 3 RV Occupancy</u> was amended to require notification to the Office when a resident has guests staying in an RV on their property. They must also be registered as guests. The Office will calendar the RV occupancy and follow-up to ensure guests do not overstay.

<u>Rule #4 Caregivers</u> was added. It is similar to that of the Rental Properties rule. Caregivers were defined in the rule. Residents employing a caregiver must ensure their caregiver(s) register at the office within 14 days of employment and caregivers must complete the Caregivers Packet. They must also provide their ID. Caregivers must follow the same rules and regulations as residents. The owner will be held responsible if the caregiver causes damage to any GTV property.

Because of this addition, all the following rules were renumbered.

<u>Rule #15 (now #16) Harassment</u> had been amended to include harassment of employees or employees harassing residents. If a resident harasses an employee, they will be asked to leave the premises.

<u>Rule #22 (now #23) Signs and decorations</u> was amended to clarify what is considered a sign. It also limits a sign 2' x 3' or a total of 6 square feet for all signs at a residence. Signs cannot be political, religious, commercial, or advertising, or contain profanity.

At the July 26 Special Board meeting, the Board approved the amendment of the Issue of Concern Reporting and Process Flow flowchart, the Violation Process Flowchart, added one new rule and amended two rules.

<u>Rule #17 Alcohol Use</u> was added. This allows alcohol to be consumed at GTV events but cannot be provided by the HOA. Alcohol can be awarded as prizes at an event but cannot be consumed at that event. Residents can bring their own alcohol to an event for consumption at that event and can share with others; it is the responsibility of the resident providing the alcohol for ensuring guests and those they share with act responsibly.

Because of this new rule, all subsequent rules were renumbered.

Rule #55 Issue Reporting was amended to allow submission of an Issue of Concern via the website.

<u>Rule #58 Board of Directors Violation Hearings</u> was amended to require all requests for a hearing of the Board of Directors to be in writing.

At the August 20th Board of Directors Meeting, the Board approved the amendment of the Parking rule

<u>Rule #20 Parking</u> was amended to allow contractors to park on streets while they are doing construction for residents. It is asked they put up orange cones.

#### **RHODY DRIVE UPDATE**

Reminder, there is now a hard closure of Wildwinds to New Hope Lane for all vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic. Access to the Oregon Coast Humane Society and the Lane County Transfer Station will be available from 35th Street. There is good news and bad news on this: Good news—we don't have all the OCHS and Transfer Station traffic; Bad news—we have to drive all the way around to get to these places.

Construction seems to be moving along nicely, even with the few hiccups, they have had to deal with. The soil nails have all been installed and and just the this past week they passed final proof testing. A final architectural finish to the soild nail wall be applied the first week of September. K&E Excavating crews continue to excavate for the Ultra Block wall foundation for the retaining wall at the front of the elevate multi-use path. About 400 lineal feet of the Ultra Block retaining wall system have been installed.

The curb along the west side of Rhododendron in the pull out parking area is being installed and they are working on placing the base material for the paved path along the top of the river back. The building of theroadway section of Rhododendron has also begun.

**Compaction Activity Alert**: With the contractor creating the road base and the base for the multiuse path there will be compaction in these areas. This process does result in some vibration that residents and visitors near the project area will feel.

#### KNOW YOUR BATTERY-PART ONE

SLA, Lithium Ion, lifepo, AGM, GEL??? The onslaught of battery types today is overwhelming but a few basics can help.

Most mobility scooters use Sealed Lead Acid (SLA) batteries that use a charger rated for the voltage of the scooter (24, 36, 48 volts are most common). The weird part is that SLA 12v batteries actually are 12.6 volts and charge to 14.4 volts: 24 volt scooters use two 12 volt batteries connected in a way to make 24 volts...28.8 actual voltage. That last voltage reading is what is important. With care most SLA batteries will last about 200 to 300 charge

cycles but can, with exceptional care, last over 1000 cycles. I would expect SLA batteries to last 2 to 3 years with typical mobility scooter use. AGM and GEL batteries are part of the Lead Acid group but differ significantly in their charging requirements and are usually more suited to speciality applications.

SLA batteries love to be fully charged. Low batteries become subject to sulfation (lead sulfate crystal build up) and lose capacity. A modern charger keeps batteries in peak condition. Wanna make that battery last? Keep it full, even plug in midday if convenient.

## The Genre for this month is ADVENTURE

**Percy Jackson and the Olympians -- 2005:** Percy Jackson & the Olympians is a series of five fantasy novels written by American author Rick Riordan, and the first book series in the Camp Half-Blood Chronicles.

**The Phantom of the Opera -- 2005:** When a disc containing memoirs of a former CIA analyst (John Malkovich) falls into the hands of Linda Litzke (Frances McDormand) and Chad Feldheimer (Brad Pitt), the two gym employees see a chance to make enough money for her to have life-changing cosmetic surgery. Predictably, events whirl out of control for the duo doofuses and those in their orbit.

**Pirates of the Caribbean At World's End -- 2007:** Will Turner (Orlando Bloom) and Elizabeth Swann (Keira Knightley) join forces with Capt. Barbossa (Geoffrey Rush) to free Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp) from Davy Jones' locker. Meanwhile, the crew of the Flying Dutchman ghost ship wreaks havoc on the Seven Seas. The friends must navigate dangerous waters to confront Chinese pirate Sao Feng (Chow Yun-Fat) and, ultimately, they must choose sides in a battle wherein the pirate life hangs in the balance.

**Pirates of the Caribbean Dead Man's Chest -- 2006:** When ghostly pirate Davy Jones (Bill Nighy) comes to collect a blood debt, Capt. Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp) must find a way to avoid his fate lest his soul be damned for all time. Nevertheless, the wily ghost manages to interrupt the wedding plans of Jack's friends Will Turner (Orlando Bloom) and Elizabeth Swann (Keira Knightley).

**The Princess and the Pea -- 2007:** A raven (Nigel Lambert) must save a kingdom and help a prince (Steven Webb) find his princess.

**The Princess Bride -- 1987:** A fairy tale adventure about a beautiful young woman and her one true love. He must find her after a long separation and save her. They must battle the evils of the mythical kingdom of Florin to be reunited with each other. Based on the William Goldman novel, "The Princess Bride", which earned its own loyal audience.

**The Princess Dairies 2: Royal Engagement -- 2004:** ia (Anne Hathaway), still coming to terms with her life as a princess, graduates from Princeton. She returns to Genovia, and her best friend, Lilly (Heather Matarazzo), goes with her. When they arrive, Mia's grandmother (Julie Andrews) informs her that Mia cannot become queen unless she is married within 30 days. Nicholas Devereaux (Chris Pine) is one of her top suitors, though he is more interested in the crown than Mia. But when Nicholas realizes he loves Mia, he decides not to pursue her.

**Ratatouille -- 2007:** Remy dreams of becoming a great chef, despite being a rat in a definitely rodent-phobic profession. He moves to Paris to follow his dream, and with the help of hapless garbage boy Linguini, he puts his culinary skills to the test in the kitchen, but he has to stay in hiding at the same time, with hilarious consequences. Remy eventually gets the chance to prove his culinary abilities to a great food critic but is the food good? A Pixar animation.

**The Adventures of Robin Hood -- 1938:** When King Richard the Lionheart is captured, his scheming brother Prince John (Claude Rains) plots to reach the throne, to the outrage of Sir Robin of Locksley (Errol Flynn), the bandit king of Sherwood Forest. Rounding up his band of men and eventually winning the support of the lovely Maid Marian (Olivia de Havilland), Robin accuses Prince John of treachery and, when the escaped Richard returns covertly to England, joins forces with the king to prevent Prince John from taking the crown.
